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

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## **National Board President's Annual Report**



### Dear Presidents and Stakeholders

2023 witnessed a successful year reinforcing the steadfast and consistent commitment which the YMCA has in New Zealand to its respective communities. We have stayed true to our mission, vision and values. As a national organisation we are always striving to better support our regionally located associations to ensure we are agile and effective in our support.

In the 2022 Annual Report we communicated our commitment to the YMCA's innovation and ability to stay current with the needs of our communities. In 2022 and 2023 this was accomplished through the initiation and delivery of the, Amplify the Y programme, a portfolio of programmes for improvement and change made possible with the support of Sport New Zealand funding. We have spent the last three years working though several of these initiatives. The following three projects in particular have made significant strides that I feel should be highlighted.

"Raise Up"- the flag-ship youth development programme that has been nationally recognised for its successful engagement with youth in our communities. This programme empowers young people through leadership, learning and event management opportunities. It has meant that we have been able to offer Raise Up programmes to all communities with a Y across NZ.

"Honouring Te Tiriti o Waitangi"- a project developed to support our national body and our local Y's to better embed Te Tiriti and Tikanga in our policies, and practices. This project really came into its own in 2023 with the appointment of Nate Rowe as a Kaitohutohu. Nate started the organisation on a great journey and the work is continuing to evolve. His work centred around assisting local associations to implement a plan to suit their individual needs and communities. This work has seen extremely positive outcomes and we are grateful for the support we've received.

"One Y"- a programme initiated to support the Y Movement to be nationally significant and locally relevant. At the centre was a focus on governance and leadership which was facilitated by Martin Jenkins. This gave the opportunity to work with all our member groups to ensure we are a strong and resilient organisation that offers the best, both nationally and locally. This work has resulted in a positive and structured path forward for the National Council, the YMCA National Board and the Member Associations. We are really pleased with the work done and have already seen positive changes through the growth in communication and collaboration amongst key stakeholders of the Y Movement.

These are not isolated successes. The Y Education program continues to go from strength to strength under the leadership of our PTE General Manager, Leona van der Hayden. 2023 has been a very successful year of delivery, achieving 85% of our funding allocation (compared to 62% in 2022). We attribute this to an ability to be agile in our offerings and having a great education team delivering high quality programmes.

Similar success has been experienced by the trusts managed by the Y New Zealand. Our adopted Investment Strategy and Policy which resulted in the appointment of Milford as the manager of the respective funds has paid dividends. In the 2023 financial year, the trusts witnessed material increases in revenue and a consequent uplift in the corpus of each trust. The prime focus of each trust is directed to youth development subject to ensuring that the corpus of each trust is grown in line with annual inflation – thus maintaining intergenerational equity. As with all years, 2023 has not been without its challenges, not the least of which was the withdrawal of Y Christchurch from the Y Movement. However, that challenge delivered its real positives in terms of engagement.

Having only been elected to the Board in June 2023, I am grateful for the contribution, support, and camaraderie of my fellow Board members, the encouragement and warmth of the National Presidents, the willingness of the CE's to bring a sense of collegiality and passion for their local communities, and the patience and assistance of Barbara Duley-Foote of the National Office.

I look forward to the year ahead and further success for the Movement.

# 2023 Annual Report – PTE

2023 saw our most successful year of delivery and outcomes for the Y Education PTE. The major highlight was ending the year with our External Evaluation and Review (EER) result from NZQA, shifting us from a Category 2 to a Category 1 education provider. This, along with achieving a fully clean TEC audit result, puts Y Education in a small group of high performing providers, something we are extremely proud to have achieved.


We also had our most successful year of delivery, achieving 85% of our funding allocation from TEC (compared to 62% in 2022). Below is a summary of the results:





### Intensive Literacy and Numeracy (ILN) Delivery by Site


### Who were our learners (Akonga)?


As a small PTE, we have the benefit of knowing our students and their whanau/support teams well. We run small classes and engage directly with our students – we know their names, faces, whanau and stories. Our learners are always at the heart of our actions and our decision making.

It is important to note that our learner make-up is different across sites and Associations. However, there are some common attributes that we know about our learners:

 High proportion of Māori: We have a high proportion of Māori learners (45% of enrolments).

- Young: The majority of our learners are 15 19 years old with the number of 15-year-old learners growing each year.
- No formal qualifications: The majority of our students come to Y Education having never achieved a formal secondary school qualification.
- Neuro-diverse: We have a large proportion of learners with neuro-diverse learning differences. This is known both anecdotally, with our Education Managers estimating that 80% present with neuro-diverse differences, and through the improvement of data being collected on learning differences.





### What did our learners say about their experience with Y Education?

In 2023 we changed the way that feedback was collected from learners. Previously, feedback was collected informally by each provider and then formally by the PTE at the end of the learner's programme. We now collect feedback throughout the learners journey, from their first month with us, through to post-graduation.

- First Impressions one month after enrolment
- Learner Wellbeing three months from enrolment
- Learner Progress four months from enrolment
- End of Programme when they complete their programme
- Post Graduate 6 months post graduation

Each survey asks our learners to provide specific feedback, along with an overall satisfaction rating for Y Education. Across all the surveys, we achieved an overall satisfaction rating of 4.5 out of 5.



### A new strategic plan for Y Education

In mid-2023, the Y Education team and Association CEs and Education Managers came together to develop a 5 year strategic plan for Y Education. This plan was approved by the National Council in late 2023. This sets a clear direction for the future with five strategic pillars and a new mission statement 'Y Education: Provider of opportunities'.

A huge thank you to our team of Educators and staff who have been a huge part of the success of Y Education. We have over 50 staff members around the country who work tirelessly to provide an amazing education experience for our learners. We are proud of the work we do and are motivated by the many success stories of our current and past students.


